Key outcomes and numbers

- Inaugural Current River Food Truck Festival sees approximately 2,500 attendees.
- Choices, a program to help youth identify potential career paths, was offered at East Carter, benefitting almost 70 students.
- Carter County 4-H programs grew and expanded! The Van Buren 4-H club grew to 30+ members and a new club in Ellsinore launched, which also has 30+ members.
- 3,069 contacts made by MU Extension in Carter County through education opportunities.

Carter County 4-H Grows & Expands!

During 2021, Carter County 4-H was busier than ever! The Van Buren 4-H Club grew and a new chapter was started in Ellsinore. The Van Buren club participated in The Heart of the Ozarks Fair and the Ripley County Fair, with members showing rabbits and goats. The East Carter Redbird 4-H Dream Team club participated in the Wayne County Fair and the Ripley County Fair, with members showing rabbits and photography. Members of both Carter County 4-H clubs participated throughout the year in shooting sports, United States flag retirement exercises, regional 4-H camps, community service projects, and 4-H recruitment efforts by painting clovers in Ellsinore and Van Buren. Both clubs also worked together in a number of fundraisers, including having booths at the Current River Food Truck Festival for face painting and popcorn, and a booth at the Festival of Lights for chili and baked goods.





County highlights

This has been a trying couple of years, including many new stressors and challenges that some of us have never seen. This year Carter County saw the need to help and asked Mary Engram and John Fuller to do a class on Adult Mental Health First Aid. How do you notice when someone is really struggling and needs help? How do you ask someone about mental health, especially if you feel they may be suicidal? Participants of the course realized the importance of addressing those concerns head on. You can save a life by attending a class that equips you with the knowledge and confidence to help someone in need.

Each year, Carter County Extension gives two scholarships to Carter County youth. 2021 recipients were Kylee Reed from Van Buren and Dana Shaffer from East Carter.

In order to fund these scholarships, Carter County Extension holds a gun raffle each fall. In Fall 2021, two guns were raffled off, a Mossberg 6.5 Creedmoor and a Keltec PMR 30 .22. Winners of the raffle were John Gargac of Grandin, MO and Theresa Wheelis of Poplar Bluff, MO.

In Fall of 2021, County Engagement Specialist Jennifer R. Williams and her colleague Amber Childers taught a three-day course called Choices at East Carter High School in collaboration with the Jobs for America's Graduates (JAG) program. Almost 70 students were able to learn more about their personality types using the Myers Briggs Type Indicator, which in turn helped them identify more career options that might be suited for their specific personality type. 

Family Nutrition Education Program

SNAP-Ed Public Value Statement 2021

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education (SNAP-Education or SNAP-Ed) brought \$9,646,109 in federal funds to Missouri. The funds support engagement with 485,010 Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients and eligible citizens of Missouri. There were 321,372 direct educational contacts. This year we had 1,383,799 indirect educational contacts through newsletters, health fairs, food pantries, and the Show Me Nutrition helpline.

827 direct and indirect contacts were made in Carter County.

Participants in SNAP-Ed learn the importance of making healthier meals and snack choices, eating breakfast more often, are more willing to try new foods, increase their physical activity, and make healthier food choices. Those who practice healthy eating and are physically active are more likely to contribute to a healthy labor force and enjoy a high quality of life throughout the lifespan.

This vital programming effort also reduces healthcare costs over the participant's lifetime, saving taxpayer money in reduced public healthcare benefits and insurance premiums.

A total of 827 direct and indirect contacts were made in Carter County.
